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K.P. IS HERE TO STAY. PERMANENT PARTY MEN WIELD LOPS IN MESS HALLS AS ALL ORD MEN LEAVE; DETAILS TO GO TO SQUADRON C.

Permanent party men received a rude shock this week, when they were called upon to perform Interior Guard and M.P. duties. This move was necessitated by the shortage of ORD men, to whom these assignments were formerly given. However, the situation should improve this week, when permanent guards and K.P. are assigned, thereby freeing the rest of the Permanent Party of this burden.

In an interview with S/Sgt. Miller, of the Sq. G Orderly Room, it was learned that it is to be this squadron to which these duties will be assigned. Now the rest of us can breathe a bit more easily.

TWENTY-FIVE CIVILIAN WORKERS WILL BE DECORATED IN CEREMONIES AT DRILL FIELD FIVE

Twenty-five civilian workers of ORD will be given awards for one year of meritorious service with the war department this morning in ceremonies at drill field five.

A parade of 300 permanent party officers and enlisted men will pass in review as a salute to the employees receiving the decorations. The presentations will be made by Col. H.K. Mooney, Commanding Officer, and he will be accompanied by his staff of officers. This ceremony will be the first for permanent party men in many weeks.

ATTORNEY GENERAL TOM CLARK STATES THAT AT LEAST 999 GI'S IN 1000 WILL GET OLD JOBS BACK.

Washington (CNS). Attorney Gen. Tom Clark states that a survey by the Department of Justice indicated that 999 of every 1000 veterans with re-employment rights "have had no difficulty concerning restoration to their old jobs."

Of about 4,000,000 former service men with re-employment rights, only 4581 had applied to the Department for assistance in obtaining their old jobs between July 1, 1944, and July 1, 1946, Mr. Clark said. And of these cases, 1325 "were settled by amicable adjustment" between U.S. attorneys and the vets' employers.

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HUGE CROWD OF THREE THOUSAND FLOCKS TO BIG TOP TO SEE GI MUSICAL, "SOUTHERN PANORAMA".

Three thousand civilians and GI's flocked to the Big Top last week to see the much-heralded musical "Southern Panorama." This is reported to have been the largest attendance in the history of ORD productions.

The audience seemed well pleased by the musical, and a superb cast acquitted themselves admirably. Marty Bahr, who, in addition to starring in the show, was its director and driving force, is now on a ten-day delay enroute to Maxwell Field, Alabama.

MILITARY POLICE SQUADRON MOVES TO FORMER ORD OFFICER SQUADRON; MESS HALL 10 CLOSED

In line with the base policy of consolidating all squadrons into as compact a unit as possible, and the closing of Mess #10, Sq. G now occupies a part of the former Squadron F area.

The present M.P. force of more than 180 men has not as yet been reduced, and with the expected addition of permanent Interior Guards, the strength of the unit will exceed the 220 mark.

185,000 WILL BE DRAFTED IN NEXT SIX MONTHS UNLESS ENLISTMENTS SHOW GREAT INCREASE

Washington (CNS). The Army has called upon Selective Service for 25,000 draftees in September, and unless an unexpected increase occurs in recruiting of volunteers, another 160,000 men must be drafted in the succeeding 6 months, Maj. Gen. Willard S. Paul reported.

The Army had a net strength of 1,715,000 persons on July 1, or 165,000 more than authorized strength, but Gen. Paul pointed out that by Sep. 30, 135,000 fathers will have been released, and said that other discharges are steadily reducing the Army's strength.
