YELLOW FEVER.

Stirring Appeal for Help for Yellow Fever Sufferers.

Nashville, Tenn., Sept. 26.—The Knights of Pythias request the publication of the following circular:

Office of Supreme Chancellor K. of P. of the World, Newark, N. J., September 24. To the Knights of Pythias everywhere:

The Grand Chancellor of the jurisdiction of Florida asks for relief for our suffering brethren at Jacksonville. Our brethren elsewhere in the South are largely in need. Yellow fever is making sad hearts in their ranks, death is on every side, utter helplessness in their condition, and immediate aid is an absolute necessity. Every moment is a moment of need. Let the response to this appeal be cordial and swift. Promptitude is life; delay means death. As ye would that others should do unto you, do ye also to them. Forward contributions to R. L. C. Implied through the Throat.

Raleigh, N. C., September 26.—There was a very singular accident yesterday at Teachy's, a station on the Wilmington and Weldon Ry. A baggage master, named William Patrick, was standing in the door of the forward mail car, and, leaning out, held a letter in his hand. In some way the hook which forms part of the mail catcher, caught him under the chin, and he was swung clear of the car. In this manner, with the hook tearing his throat, he was carried fully one hundred yards before he was thrown down. The man will probably die.

Gathering of Odd Fellows Postponed.

Philadelphia, Sept. 26.—Grand Master W. M. T. Foster, and Grand Secretary B. Browzer, of the Grand United Order of Odd Fellows, today announce that the Grand Committee of Arrangements for the fourth biennial meeting of the order, which was to have convened in Nashville on the 2nd of October, has requested that the meeting be postponed until the fourth Tuesday in November, and that the sub-committee of Management has confirmed the request, and notified all Lodges within its jurisdiction.

Short in Her Cash.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 26.—Mrs. Becker, one of the oldest and most trusted counters in the redemption division of the Treasury, was found \$944 short in her cash and has been dismissed from the service after making good the deficiency. She was appointed in 1865 by President Johnson. Her duty was to count the worn-out, mutilated notes sent to the Treasury for redemption. The matter has been placed before the United States District Attorney.

Unveiling a Confederate Monument.

Staunton, Va., Sept. 25.—The monument to the Confederate dead buried here was unveiled today in the presence of 5,000 persons. The granddaughter of Gen. Albert Sidney Johnston, assisted by young ladies from every State represented in the ceremony, unveiled the monument, and addresses were delivered by Gov. Lee, Gen. Early, Gen. Rosser and Mr. McCulloch, of Annapolis.

A French Veteran Reported Dead.

London, Sept. 26.—A despatch from Madrid announces that Gen. Bazaine died in the city Sunday. The cause of death was heart disease. He had been ill for several days. The funeral takes place tomorrow.

Frost in Alabama.

Montgomery, Ala., Sept. 25.—Telegrams to the Advertiser state that there was frost last night in many parts of Alabama and within twenty miles of this city. The temperature here was 54.

"Judge Lynch" Settled It.

Chicago, Sept. 26.—A special from Cuba, Mo., says: Lewis Davis, who for six months has been confined in the St. Louis jail on a charge of murdering David Miller, and who was brought here last Tuesday for trial, was taken from the jail by a mob early Sunday morning and hanged.

DEATH OF DR. MORAN.—Rev.

Dr. Robert S. Moran, whose death was briefly mentioned yesterday, was of Irish parentage and birth. He came to this country when young and was educated at the Methodist School of the Prophets at Middletown, Connecticut. After being connected with a New York Conference for some years he came to North Carolina, we believe, about 1856, and joined the N. C. Conference, M. E. Southern Church. He at once became a prominent figure in that religious body, and in a few years his fame as a preacher went throughout the State. He was a thorough theologian, one of the ablest we ever knew. He was a fine critical scholar and a close student. He was endowed with noble natural powers which had been steadily and systematically trained and developed.—Wilmington Star.

IMPRESSIVE CEREMONIES AT THE UNVEILING OF THE CONFEDERATE MONUMENT.

At 5 p. m., yesterday, after the first day's contests of the tournament, the procession was formed, led by the Greensboro Cornet Band, making an imposing cortege of the Guilford Grays, the orator, chaplain, ladies of the Memorial Association and other citizens in carriages, followed b

large numbers on foot.

At Greene Hill Cemetery the exercises opened with a beautiful selection of appropriate music from the Greensboro Cornet Band, at the conclusion of which Rev. Dr. J. Henry Smith asked God's blessing upon the people before him, who were assembled to honor the memory of those brave, true men whose lives had been given nobly to a noble cause. Brief, earnest, touching, it was an eloquent invocation, and received reverently with bowed heads and full hearts.

After music Mayor J. A. Barringer delivered the address, of which it is not expected of us to give here even a summary. The graceful and impassioned speaker, passing by the political causes which had ushered in the great revolution of more than a quarter of a century ago, touched the hearts and moved the souls of his listeners with the sentiments which had followed the cause with prayers and hallowed it with tears and now cherish in enduring memory the past and "its unshedded dead." Beautifully—in softly modulated tones and graceful enunciation—the dedicatory poem was recited by Miss Daisy Caldwell, after which the statue was unveiled by Misses Daisy Caldwell, Alice Jones, Mary Dixon and Retta Leftwich.

The bronze figure is a fine piece of work; a master hand posed the stalwart form and stamped that grim, sad, care-lined face; and, as the veil was drawn away by woman's tender hand, we felt as if from out the shadow all the tragedy of that great struggle was creeping into sight and view.

Seldom have we looked upon a more beautiful but solemn picture than the scene presented just at that moment: the hushed and waiting crowds, and at their feet the sod-grown tomb and fresh-made grave; and grouped about this silent sentry those fair young ladies who had placed him on his post—with evening's lingering, mellow light irradiating all.
