TO THE DEMOCRATS OF GILMER AND MOREHEAD TOWNSHIPS.

Ere another issue of the PATRIOT reaches its destiny the great political conflict will have been ended and the result recorded.

From the firing of the first gun of the campaign down to the present time, the PATRIOT has been first and foremost in the thickest of the fight, battling for the success of the Democratic party in our county, district, State and nation; and now, while the western horizon is painted red with the burning rays of a setting sun, we are proclaiming our farewell appeal to the white men of old Guilford to keep green in their hearts the heroic deeds and undying patriotism of our immortal ancestors who have long since been called to the dust from whence they came, by perpetuating the principles of pure Democracy and white supremacy, with equal rights to all and special privileges to none; principles of the people by the people and for the people; principles that guarantee the greatest good to the greatest number; principles that will be living and prevailing when those of our enemy will have long since been forgotten and consigned to the archives of gravity.

The great good that will accrue from Democratic supremacy has already been set forth in this paper time and again. Therefore, what we want to urge upon our people is the importance of a united effort in Morehead and Gilmer townships at the polls to-morrow. We have it from thoroughly reliable sources that the Democratic candidates will come to Greensboro with a good working majority; therefore the result depends upon the vote of these two townships.

We once more appeal to the former Democrats who have seen fit to cast their lot with another organization, to open their eyes to these facts and take an unprejudiced view of the situation. As white men, we appeal to white men in the third party to reflect seriously now, while there is yet time to avert the terrible consequences which threaten the best interests of all honest and upright citizens, because of Democratic accessions to ranks of the third party.

By the love they bear for their race, by the love they have for their wives, mothers, sisters and children, by the love they have for honest government and all that is pure and holy, we appeal to them to call a halt in their reckless march, and come over and help us in this great struggle against the evils which Radical supremacy would fasten upon us and upon them. The Democratic party, in which we and you have confided in the past, renews its obligations to all the people to continue its best efforts to relieve the toiling masses from the burdens under which they have so long been groaning, protect our sacred firesides against the "torch and the dagger," and so administer our public affairs that the white winged Angel of Peace

will sit upon every hill top from Maine to California, while our gigantic strides in the industrial and commercial world will command the respect of all the nations of the world, and extort the admiration of generations yet unborn.

The history of the horrors of the Republican party in North Carolina forms the blackest page in all our history—a party that enacts statutes of tyranny, and allowed American free born citizens to be arrested without warrant or law; denied them the right of trial by jury, and incarcerated in dismal forts and dungeons some of our best and purest men, and with mock trials and suborned witnesses condemned them before drum-head court-martial and sentenced them to death—in fine, a party that shifts its sail to every breeze, and denounces to-morrow its most solemn pledges of to-day.

In conclusion, we say to the Democrats and white men of Guilford, march to the polls to-morrow in one solid phalanx, shoulder to shoulder, and touch elbow to elbow.

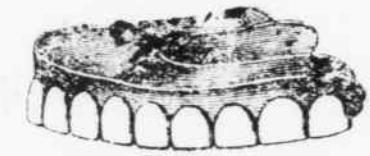

## Local News.

**SUSPENSION.**—We intend to "practice what we preach," and will religiously devote to-morrow to the Democratic cause. Hence we will issue no paper to-morrow—the first suspension so far in the career of the DAILY PATRIOT, except on the 4th of July, national holiday. On Wednesday we will present to our readers the latest election news up to the hour of going to press.

**GOING AHEAD.**—Westminster Presbyterian Church is going right ahead in the upbuilding of God's Kingdom on earth. A few days since this church celebrated the first anniversary of its organization, and showed an increase in membership of 36 during the first year under the pastorate of Rev. E. W. Smith (undoubtedly one of the most promising young divines in the South). Yesterday a congregational meeting of the members of the church was held to take into consideration the advisability of increasing the capacity of the church by the addition of a basement. A subscription was taken up with that view and fifty dollars over the amount required subscribed. Work will commence on the basement without delay; and when this improvement is made Westminster will be one of the handsomest and most conveniently arranged edifices in the city.

**SPLENDID MUSIC.**—The city of Greensboro is to be congratulated upon the excellence of its amateur musical and dramatic talent. The entertainment given last Friday evening by the Beatrice Club, at the residence of Capt. W. S. Ball, was decidedly one of the most enjoyable and *recherché* of the season. The house and grounds were beautifully decorated with colored lanterns, etc., and the guests were enthusiastic in their praise of the ladies and gentlemen who contributed to their pleasure during the evening:—Messrs. Woodruff and Alderman, whose excellence in orchestral and concert music is superior to eulogy; Miss Myra Alderman, the "sweet singer" of our social coteries; Miss Stone, one of the most finished and accomplished pianists in the State, gifted with marvelous sweetness of expression and facility of execution; and Mrs. W. T. Chichester, who drew withering and dulcet strains from the violin, her graceful hand evoking all the magic of the bridge and the bow.

**AN INCENDIARY FOR GOVERNOR.**—Whatever may be the result of this election, the intelligent white people of North Carolina can never forgive or forget the infamy of Col. Dockery's conduct on the stump. After the inauguration of Fowle into the gubernatorial chair, his competitor will sink into the dishonorable obscurity which he so richly deserves, followed by the contempt of his fellow-citizens whom he has so ruthlessly insulted and outraged. A correspondent of the News and Observer says of his speech at Smithfield:

On the night of November 1st O. H. Dockery had an appointment to speak at Smithfield. Capt. Kitchin also had an appointment to speak at the same time and place, but was unable to be present. Col. Dockery refused to consider any offer to divide time. He then commenced to address a crowd of two hundred negroes and fourteen white Radicals, of whom ten were candidates. Col. Dockery spoke for an hour and three quarters, making one of the most deceitful, incendiary and demagogical speeches ever heard in Smithfield. The negroes grew wild with excitement. Dockery told them that if the present system of county government was not changed there would be bloodshed in the land. After it became apparent that Col. Dockery would consume the entire night, Mr. Pou commenced to address a crowd of two hundred white men, and never has the writer heard a more crushing denunciation than Mr. Pou heaped upon the Radical candidate and his methods.
