> A Leather Gan .- The Cuban patriots have invented a curious cannon of leather as a substitute for the metal field pieces, which they are mable to obtain. The barrel of the gun is about three feet and a half long, and is made by stretching stout, well dressed leather in a soaked state upon a mould four inches in diameter, and sowing the edges with cords of the pativo ita des corojo, which has great tenacity When dry, another thickness of wet leather is stretched upon the first layer, and four more are subsequently added. The breach is made of hard wood, and the chamber is often lined with t.n .-These guns fire from ten to twenty rounds before becoming unfit for use, and are usually loaded with stones, through the absence of grape and canister. They have done considerable execution; and are lightly transported in pairs upon the shoulders of a man. When used, they are laid upon the ground, and pointed at short range upon an approaching column.

Value of Re-Plant Corn .- The practice of re-planting corn is common enough, being usual on every farm and plantation where the stand is not perfect in the first instance. Acc te suggestion of an intelligent planter the crop, more than is apparent, and he bimself makes it a rule, whether the first stand is good or not. If the first stand is periect, as rarely occurs, he still re-plants in about every fifteenth twentieth hill in every touth or fifteenth row, either cutting out the plant already growing, or putting in an extra hill, if the space will admit. The purpose of the replanted, or late stalks, is to furnish poilen, in case a dry spell should wit the tassels of the first planting before the grains are filled. One stalk in two hundred will shed pollen in abun-

If the weather turns very dry in the filling time, both the silks and tassels wilt. When rain falls, if it comes in time, the silks recover and become fresh again, but the tassel once dry

does not revive. The re-planted corn being younger will when the tassel blooms furnish pol len for all the older stalks round. Deficent or unfilled ears are caused by want of pollen on the silk.


