Another cloud that hovered around and hangs low over the self-supporting woman, is the isolated life she is almost necessarily compelled to lead. Few in the social world are brave enough to receive into their "set" a woman who by daily toil renders herself independent. A rigid observance of conventionalities engender so many restrictions that they hardly dare to overstep the dividing line of the two worlds—the social—the useful. When into a woman's life come reverses, and she is thrown on her own resources does it detract from her true womanhood to engage in honorable pursuit of employment? Does it lessen her innate refinement or modesty? The field is broad and almost unlimited, he not afraid you men that she will ever infringe on your rights; a true woman would never willingly go beyond her own sphere, she desires to retain her dignity and self-esteem under all circumstances, and she can not expect to do so or to inspire respect if she allows herself to deviate from the paths in life allotted her. "We are told continually that life is a warfare, consequently we want firmness and bravery to meet the conflict; we are told that life has golden opportunities which if neglected may never occur again; consequently we want the habit of doing right consistently and on principle in order that we may be ready at any moment to seize these opportunities and turn them to best account. We are told we must expect disappointment and trouble to attend on every stage of our earthly career and for these we want patience and we want the habit of doing right in all we do. On the other hand we know that in life we shall also find much to enjoy, consequently we want self-government and moderation; we know that a seeming happiness will often present itself as real; or a real happiness which is not for us, and for this as indeed for all things; we want the power of self-denial with a well-disciplined resolution of will; we know that life has duties to be discharged requiring kindness, forbearance and brotherly love, requiring an strong faith, earnestness of purpose, and devotedness of soul; we know that the highest and noblest attainments of life, and far reaching in their influence and that to live in the true sense of living is to diffuse life; to impart vitality and strength of the lives of others."

And from this woman's life, we must think that these subjects she had made the study of her life; casting out from her nature all that which savored of the commonplace; and cultivating all that which was pure gold.
