On the next page are four tables giving results of some of the anthropometric work among the students of the College. These are arrived at from four different stand-points, each giving the AVERAGE DETERMINATION OF CERTAIN BODILY CHARACTERISTICS.

The first table gives the AVERAGES OF ALL THE STUDENTS of Amherst College between the years 1861-2 and 1887-8; of about 2000 individuals.

The second table represents the results of those who were OF THE AVERAGE HEIGHT of the students: 1725 millimeters or about 68 inches.

The third table is made from those who were of the age of 21 years and one month, or the AVERAGE AGE of the students of the College for the past 27 years.

The fourth table is arranged according to the DOCTRINE OF MEANS, and is secured from only about 500 students.

These tables are made out in both the English and the metric systems.
