## Naming Of Campus Buildings Honor Past College Heads, Faculty Members

Chancellor Gordon W. Blackwell has announced that two former heads of Woman's College and four early faculty members have been honored in the naming of campus buildings. The announcement followed approval by the university trustees.

Four of the buildings are now in existence and the fifth and sixth are wings of the new building under construction.

The Administration Building will bear the name of Julius I. Foust, the second president of the college who retired in 1934 after 32 years of service.

The library will be named in honor of Dr. Walter Clinton Jackson. Dr. Jackson was a teacher of history, head of the History Department, Vice-President of the college, Dean of Administration, and chancellor. He retired in 1950 after 41 years of service.

### Science Honors Petty

The Science Building has been named the Mary Petty Building. Miss Petty was head of the Chemistry Department from 1893 until 1934. She joined the faculty one year after the college opened in Greensboro.

Wade R. Brown, for whom the Music Building is being named, initiated the annual state music contest-festival in 1919. He was first dean of the School of Music and a member of the faculty from

1912 to 1936.

### Dorm Names Selected

Miss Mary Taylor Moore will be honored in the naming of the south wing of the hall being constructed. Miss Moore was an alumna of the college and its registrar until her death in 1948.

The north wing of the dormitory will be named Strong Hall in honor of Miss Cornelia Strong. Her career with the college as a teacher of mathematics began in 1905 and continued until her retirement in 1948.

New Guilford Hall has been re-named Guilford Hall since there is now no other building on the campus with the name Guilford. Old Guilford stood where the campus Soda Shop was built.

## Philosophy Seminar Opens For WC Alumnae

A Philosophy Seminar for Woman's College alumnae will be held Feb. 27-28 in the legislature room of Elliott Hall. The topic of discussion is "Mid-Twentieth Century Philosophies in Relation to the Contemporary World."

### Alumnae and Faculty

Because of the nature of the seminar, attendance is being limited to alumnae selected from philosophy classes from 1949-1958, honor graduates from the years 1945-1948, and participating members of the faculty.

The program has been planned to fulfill the request that many of the guests made in response to a questionnaire which had been issued earlier.

### Program

Dr. Ashby, head of the Philosophy Department, will open the seminar on Saturday at 9:30 a.m. with a discussion of the leading schools of philosophy in the mid-twentieth century. During the remaining sessions, seminar leaders will describe the relations between these philosophies and the novel, painting, poetry, psychiatry, psychology politics, and sociology. A discussion period will follow each presentation.

## Dr. Current Granted Absence To Take Columbia U. Position

Dr. Richard N. Current, head of the Department of History and Political Science, has been granted leave of absence to become professor of American History at Columbia University during the academic year of 1960-61. He will teach a graduate lecture course and conduct a doctoral seminar on the period of the Civil War and Reconstruction.

### Lincoln Scholar

A leading Lincoln scholar, Dr. Current delivered the principal address earlier this month at the Library of Congress symposium, in connection with the publication of the first two volumes of a new Lincoln chronology by the Lincoln Sesquicentennial Commission.

For the completion of the fourth and final volume of James G. Randall's *Lincoln, the President*, following the death of Dr. Randall, Dr. Current received the Bancroft Prize of 1956. He is also the author of seven books, including *The Lincoln Nobody Knows*, published in 1958.

## Professor James Liu Aiding WC In Asian Study Program

Professor James T. C. Liu, of the University of Pittsburg visited the Woman's College campus on February 17 and 18 to consult with various faculty members concerning the college's Asian Studies Program.

The Woman's College, along with numerous other colleges and universities throughout the United States, has become increasingly aware of the fact that too few students have any real understanding of the important continent of Asia, which covers approximately one-third of the surface of the earth and houses two-thirds of its inhabitants.

## WC Student Body To Vote On Judicial System Amendment

A proposed constitutional amendment from Judicial and Honor Boards provoked a two-hour discussion in Legislature last week in which the body voted to initiate action on the bill. In accordance with constitutional regulations governing amendments, the proposal will be brought to Mass Meeting, March 2, where a two-thirds majority vote will be necessary for ratification.

### Discussions

During the stipulated two-week period, discussions are to be held in the dormitories in order to inform the student body at large.

Presented by Judicial Chairman Doris Ann McGill, the proposal comes from a study made by both boards following last year's change in the Judicial system. After an explanatory reading of the bill, Winfield representative Barbara Boerner called for discussion, which was approved by the body.

### Debate Arises

As the five-section proposal was considered by paragraphs, questions and debate came from the floor and resulted in changes by substitution and editorial addition. (A revised copy of the ac-

cepted bill may be found on page 4.) Major discussion was directed at sections One and Five and arose out of points of question in regard to an interpretive position of the boards and to the rights of the defense.

Legislator Boerner proposed a change in the naming of the two bodies, moving that the Judicial and Honor Boards be called the Court of Social Regulation and Honor Court respectively. Reasons for the change were brought out by representatives who felt that the nature of the two groups and the rights granted both board members and the accused resembled those relating to a court. Debate hinged largely on an interpretation of the meanings of Board and Court, and differences were largely differences of interpretation.

### Board Function As Juries

Supporters of the present classification seemed to feel that the Boards functioned more as juries. Jamison House President Sudie Duncan contended that the jury principle was destroyed by the presence of a house president during discussions of the individual

## Poet Jarrell Named Member Of National Hon. Arts Institute

Randall Jarrell, professor of English at Woman's College, poet, novelist and critic, is the third writer now living in North Carolina to be elected to membership in the National Institute of Arts and Letters.

Francis Speight, an artist born in North Carolina, is also among the twelve new members elected to the institute from the fields of art, music, and literature.

Members in the institute include such notables as Carl Sandburg, Flat Rock, N. C. and Paul Green of Chapel Hill.

### Institute

The Institute was founded in 1898 and was incorporated by an act of Congress in 1913 for the furtherance of the fine arts and literature in the United States. Membership is limited to 25 native or naturalized citizens qualified by notable achievements in the fine arts.

A ceremony on May 25 will formally induct the new members and each will receive the diploma of the institute.

### Writings

Mr. Jarrell came to WC in 1947, and has published works including four volumes of poetry, a novel, and several hundred poems, articles, and reviews in journals, newspapers, and nationally circulated magazines.

In 1956-58 he served as Consultant in poetry in English to the Library of Congress.

A graduate of Vanderbilt University, Mr. Jarrell has taught at Kenyon College, Sarah Lawrence College, and the University of Texas. He has presented to the WC library a selection of his working notes, original drafts of his poems, and book manuscripts.

Professor and Mrs. Jarrell live in a home they built last year in the Guilford College community.

## CONCERNING CONSTITUTION CHANGE . . . .

Last year the student body gave Honor Board the power to try cases and thereby put it on an equal basis with Judicial Board. This year after working with the system we have found that the functions and policies of the two boards cannot be entirely separated. For example, the Judicial System has been somewhat handicapped when having an honor and social violator tried at a joint meeting of both boards. In such cases there were two chairmen which made proceedings rather awkward for the board members and the violators. At other times, the Board Chairmen were forced to act in many capacities during one trial.

In initiating this proposed change in the Judicial System the two boards feel that it would enable the entire system to run more smoothly and more effectively. This change would hope to unify the system by having one person who would be both directly and indirectly responsible for the procedures of the system.

The Judicial Chairman would know only the information about the case which was presented to the court; therefore, she would be the logical person to vote in the case of a tie concerning the decision of the court. She would be better qualified to consider postponement of the penalties which the courts might give. By giving the Judicial Chairman the authority to postpone penalties, the President of S. G. A. would be released of a responsibility and the three branches of our government would be more concretely defined.

The duties of the Executive Secretaries would certainly follow a definite outline. The court would function as a non-trying group under the Executive Secretary's leadership and yet her role during a trial would be more clearly defined. Each Executive Secretary would have the responsibility of securing the information and investigating the circumstances surrounding the cases of her respective court. She would question the girl in the same manner as that of the present chairman. Since she would be working so closely with the student body, we feel that she should be elected by the student body.

Appointing Recording Secretaries for the respective courts would relieve much of the burden now placed on the Secretary and Treasurer of S. G. A. We feel that being secretary of the respective courts would entail enough to merit having two people who are not already major S. G. A. officers.

The section concerning the rights of the accused would simply put these rights in the constitution rather than in judicial policies. We think these rights demand a place in the constitution so that the rights of all students would never be overlooked. Concerning the counsel of defense: a student may have someone to act in her defense if she desires. The counsel of defense would remain in the court until all the facts concerning the case had been discussed. Neither the counsel of defense nor the house president would be present during the voting.

Actually, this proposed judicial change would not alter the present system to any great extent. The Honor Court and the Court of Social Regulations would only be new names for the present boards. Honor violators and social offenders would still be taken to these respective courts. The Judicial Chairman would head the system for better co-ordination between the courts and for better organization in the Judicial Systems.

Having worked under the present Judicial System, it is our belief that while it is essentially good, it would be much improved by this proposed change.

It was quite a scene in Louis Armstrong's dressing room during intermission of the Jazz Concert that he gave here in Greensboro on February 12. The great Ambassador of Jazz was sitting at his dressing table signing autographs still in a sweat from an exhausting first half of blowing his golden trumpet.

That golden trumpet was sitting in its case on the dressing table just inside the door. It was quite an impressive instrument, probably more so because it belonged to Louis Armstrong. It was of a golden color and had beautiful engravings all over it.

### Jazz Always Present

Satch's little transistor radio was blaring away jazz. Even in his resting moments, Satch never seems to get away from the sounds that are his life. Louis had a big

hello for everyone especially the kids and his only thought was for his fans. He didn't even have time to take care of his partly swollen lip, he was so busy talking to everyone.

He talked about big bands versus little bands and said that it didn't matter about the size. He liked any band just so long as the sound was good — that was what mattered. He compared his playing back in around the 30's to his playing now and said that he was enjoying it just as much. The styles have changed many times since he started playing, but he keeps playing what he likes and seems to last. He also mentioned that boys now, starting out with playing in a band as a goal, don't have the stamina and perseverance to rough all the bad breaks and still keep trying for the top,

as they used to.

### Reminiscences

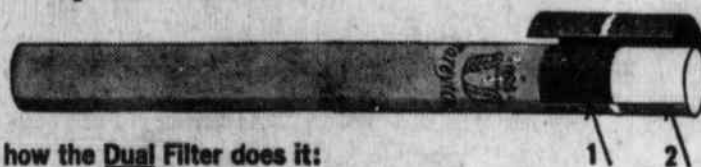
But the most enjoyable part of the conversation with Louis was when he reminisced about the long ago days in jazz; days that were filled with such jazz greats as Buddy Bolden, King Oliver, Lead-belly and Jelly Roll Morton. The mention of King Oliver and Lead-belly in particular brought a smile to his face and a gleam to his eye. He had heard Buddy Bolden play and his face saddened when he spoke of Buddy Bolden and how he "blew himself crazy," right into an insane asylum. But on a happier note, he talked of his days with one of the greats, King Oliver. He talked of the days playing in the saloons of New Orleans with King Oliver. One can read all about the King Oliver days but to hear

cases and thereby it assumed the nature of a court.

Legislators seemed to feel that the naming of the two groups had more than external significance because when affected, it would establish the judicial system on the basis of court procedure. Honor Board Chairman Ann Phillips pointed out that due to the absence of trained lawyers on the campus, the Board was maintained by members of the student body acting in the manner of a jury. Upon the conclusion of discussion, the body voted to accept the proposed change.

Section Two and Three dealing with the duties of the Judicial Chairman and membership of the Courts were discussed individually and accepted with minor editorial changes.

### Council Defense Discussed

The fifth section regarding council for the defense was discussed next. Chairman McGill pointed out that members of the student body had always had the privilege of choosing a defense and that the section simply defined the privilege. Points of clarification arose questioning the rights of the defense in remaining in the room during the discussion of the case. Representatives opposing the presence of a defense after the accused had stated her case posed their objectives mainly on a jury principle. Opinion seemed to indicate that speakers felt that the Board members would be handicapped in discussing the case if the defense remained to cross-examine. The position of a house president was discussed and defined as a dual role, that of a witness bringing the case to the attention of the Board and, as traditional, appearing in defense of the accused.

Support for the defense centered on the principle that if the House President remained, as is the house policy, that the defendant should also be allowed to stay for the discussion. Points were made that since the accused had been granted the right to a defense, she should be allowed the privileges of a defense.

### Assembly to Vote

Discussion subsided and the group moved to accept the change, allowing the defense to remain throughout the discussion. Miss Boerner moved that the bill be brought before mass meeting. The motion was accepted. Chairman Carol Carson clarified the proposal by stating that the bill would first go to the dormitories for discussion during the two week waiting period.

Other Legislature business included the approval of members of the Handbook Committee, Publications Board, and State Student Legislature Board.

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# Judicial System Change Proposed

## Article IV — Judicial

**Section 1.** The judicial power of the Student Government Association of the Woman's College shall be vested in a College Judicial System under the supervision of the Judicial Chairman. The Judicial System shall be under the supervision of the Judicial Chairman. The Judicial System shall be composed of two branches: The Honor Court and the Court of Social Regulations.

### Section 2. Judicial Chairman.

A. The Judicial Chairman shall be elected from the incoming Senior Class.

B. The duties of the Judicial Chairman shall be:

1. To co-ordinate all functions of the two courts.
2. To interpret and clarify any rule or policy whenever the need arises.
3. To preside at all meetings of both boards and to vote only in the case of a tie.
4. To consider postponement of penalties.

### Section 3. Membership.

A. Each court shall be composed of the Judicial Chairman, an Executive Secretary, a Recording Secretary, and eight voting members who shall be appointed by the President of Student Government in consultation with the Judicial Chairman, the Executive Secretary of the court concerned, and confirmed by Legislature. Each court shall elect a member of the faculty to act in an advisory capacity.

B. Executive Secretary.

1. Each court shall have an Ex-

ecutive Secretary elected from the incoming Senior Class.

2. The duties of the Executive Secretary shall be:

- a. To receive and investigate reports of all offenses.
- b. To schedule all cases.
- c. To act as presiding officer of her court in the absence of the Judicial Chairman.

C. Recording Secretary.

1. Each court shall have a Recording Secretary who shall be appointed by the Judicial Chairman in consultation with the respective Executive Secretaries.

2. The duty of the Recording Secretary shall be to keep an accurate record of all the proceedings of her court and carry out necessary correspondence.

D. Each hall shall have a Hall Board composed of the House President, four other members elected by the Hall and a member of the Court of Social Regulation. This board shall name a secretary from the board who shall submit a written report of the proceedings of the Hall Board to the Recording Secretary of the Court of Social Relations.

During the first eight weeks of school, the Freshmen Hall Boards shall be composed of the House President, a member of the Court, etc. and three upperclassmen appointed by the House President. The members appointed shall be subject to the approval of the Judicial Chairman.

### Section 4. Judicial Powers.

A. The College Judicial System shall encompass all cases of disci-

pline not delegated to other authorities.

B. The College Court of Social Regulations shall classify social offenses as major or minor. The College Court of Social Regulations shall deal with all major social offenses. The Hall Board shall deal with all the minor social offenses.

The College Honor Court shall deal with all honor violations.

The College Court of Social Regulations and Honor Court shall meet together to deal with cases which involve honor and social violations.

C. The College Court of Social Regulations shall act as a board of review for Hall Board cases when it is requested. The decision of the College Court of Social Regulations and of Honor Court shall be final in all matters of discipline except in cases in which the penalty is suspension or expulsion. These cases shall be subject to review by the Chancellor.

D. The two courts which comprise the Judicial System shall have final authority to interpret Student Government Regulations.

### Section 5. Right of the Accused.

To every student shall be secured the right of due process and fair hearing, the presumption of innocence until found guilty, the right to know the evidence and face witnesses testifying against her, and the right to advice and assistance in her own defense from another member of the student body or of the faculty of the Woman's College.

Satch tell it is better than any reading.

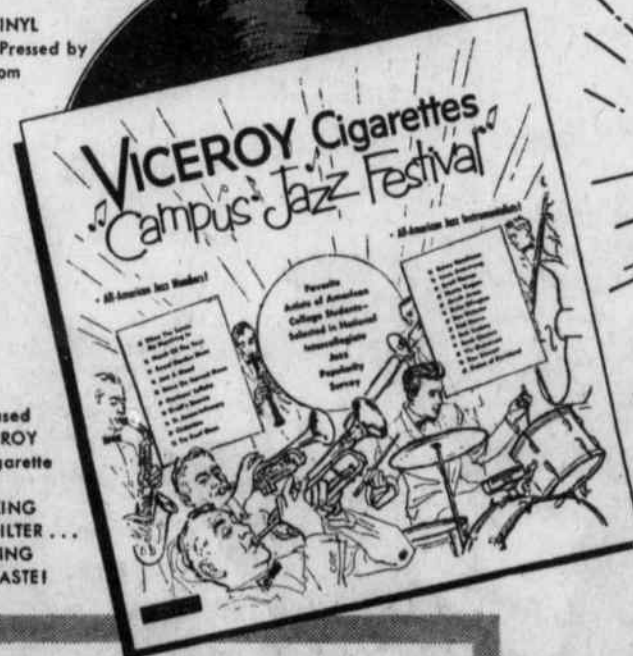
Louis Armstrong has quite a dynamic personality, as one can tell when he gets on stage, but talking to old Satchelmouth himself is an experience second to none.
