Selecting the Winner

UNC-G will hold its annual Homecoming Court elections on Friday, Oct. 25. Voting will take place from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and voting booths will be located both in Elliott Center and the dining halls.

A field of 30 candidates, nominated by various campus organizations were interviewed by a judging panel of students, faculty, and administrators. The candidates were judged on Scholarship, Personality and Charm, General Appearance, Speaking Ability, and Student Activity Involvement. Candidates also were required to meet a minimum grade point average of 2.3. Also, candidates running for the position of Homecoming Queen must be a junior or senior, while

underclassmen may run for positions as Homecoming Princesses.

The judging process left a field of nine contestants to be voted on by the student body. Six of these contestants will be running for the position of Homecoming Queen. The first two runners up to the position of Homecoming Queen will assume positions as Maids of Honor. The remaining three (who are underclassmen) will be running for positions as Homecoming Princesses. Of the three contestants running for this position, two Princesses will be elected.

This year's Homecoming Court will be announced and the Queen crowned during halftime ceremonies at Saturday's soccer game with Winthrop College. This year's Homecoming Queen will succeed Angel Chavis of High Point, who received the honor last year.

Spartans to Meet Winthrop

The soccer team at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro will attempt to break a two-game losing streak before a homecoming crowd when it hosts Winthrop College Saturday (Oct. 26).

The match is scheduled for 2 p.m. on the campus field at UNC-G and there is no admission charge. Various festivities are planned as the University celebrates homecoming for the fourth consecutive year.

UNC-G, now 12-5 overall, lost a pair of matches on a road trip to Florida in the past week. The Spartans dropped a 1-0 decision at Rollins College on Tuesday and lost 2-1 at Flagler College last Saturday.

Coach Michael Parker's team is ranked No. 5 nationally in this week's NCAA Division III top 20 poll.

UNC-G is paced in scoring by sophomore midfielder Steve Harrison of Derbyshire, England, who has scored 10 goals and made six assists. Junior forward Andrew Mehalko of Hialeah, Fla., has scored 10 goals and made four assists while sophomore forward Willie Lopez of Miami, Fla., has scored seven goals and made 10 assists. Junior midfielder Ron Bertolaccini of Medford, Mass., has netted eight

The Spartans have won two consecutive Homecoming matches, defeating Washington and Lee University, 7-0, in 1984 and Erskine College, 1-0, in 1983. The University of Notre Dame handed UNC-G a 3-1 overtime setback in 1982, the season homecoming was revived.

Two regular season games remain on the Spartans' schedule following the contest with Winthrop. UNC-G will host

Booze Bowl To Be Held This Weekend

In addition to the Homecoming festivities slated for this weekend, Alcohol Awareness Week will be in full swing. Several activities are scheduled for this weekend in accordance with a national observance on college campuses of the concerns surrounding the use of alcohol. The events are being coordinated through a committee consisting of both students and administrators, and are being sponsored by various campus organizations.

A "Booze Bowl" will be held on Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday, the 23, 24, and 25 of October, in the Sharpe-Melver Lobby of EUC. The Booze Bowl will follow the same format as that of a "College Bowl" game; and will

consist of two teams answering alcohol related trivia questions. Prizes will be awarded to the winners.

On Wednesday, Oct. 23, from 4:30 to 5:30 p.m., an event entitled "Alcohol, the Law and You" will be held at 'the rock' in front of the cafeteria. The event will feature the demonstration of field sobriety tests, and will answer questions concerning the use of alcohol. The event will be presented by Dan Bibeau of UNC-G's Health Education Department. Bettina Shuford, of UNC-G's Student Development and Programming Office, and an "Alcohol Awareness Week" coordinating committee member, explained that the field sobriety testing techniques will be useful to persons who would like to determine if friends should be allowed to drive after having con-

sumed alcoholic beverages.

On Thursday, Oct. 24, a panel discussion entitled "To Drink or Not to Drink" will be held in Edwards Lounge of the Stone Building, from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. The discussion will be centered upon issues relating to alcohol and the change in drinking age. Panelists will include a bartender, an attorney, a representative of a local beverage distributing company, an ABC board member, a clergyman, and a DWI instructor.

A "Mocktails Bar" will take place on Friday, Oct. 25, in Benbow Room of EUC from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m. This event will consist of a social hour with beer and wine, and non-alcoholic cocktails which are called 'mocktails'.

"Alcohol Awareness Week" activities will conclude with a Grand Prize drawing to take place during the Homecoming soccer game on Saturday, Oct. 26.

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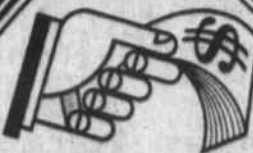
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
