Bryan marks anniversary

The Joseph M. Bryan School of Business and Economics, UNCG's largest professional school, will celebrate its 25th anniversary this weekend with an alumni golf tournament, to be held at Stoney Creek Golf Course, and a dinner at the Marriott Hotel.

Both events are being sponsored by the Bryan School Alumni Association, which was formed this year.

Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) commissioner, Gene Corrigan, will be the featured speaker at the dinner. All alumni are invited to attend.

Dr. James K. Weeks, Dean of the Bryan School of Business and Economics, said that the Bryan School of Business has existed in some form since the founding of the University.

At one time, the Bryan School was known as the Commercial Department.

"The Bryan School can trace its roots all the way back to the

founding of UNCG," Weeks said.

In the 25 years since the school's founding, more than 11,500 undergraduate and graduate degrees have been awarded.

Currently, there are approximately 1,500 Bryan undergraduates as well as 350 graduate students.

The Bryan School of Business is currently in the process of internationalizing its curriculum in an effort to better prepare graduates to face the modern business world.

According to sophomore Maria Tranquillo, who is majoring in Business, taking classes in the Bryan School can benefit students in a variety of majors.

"Some of the classes are hard, but they'll probably help me some day if I open a business of my own," Tranquillo said.

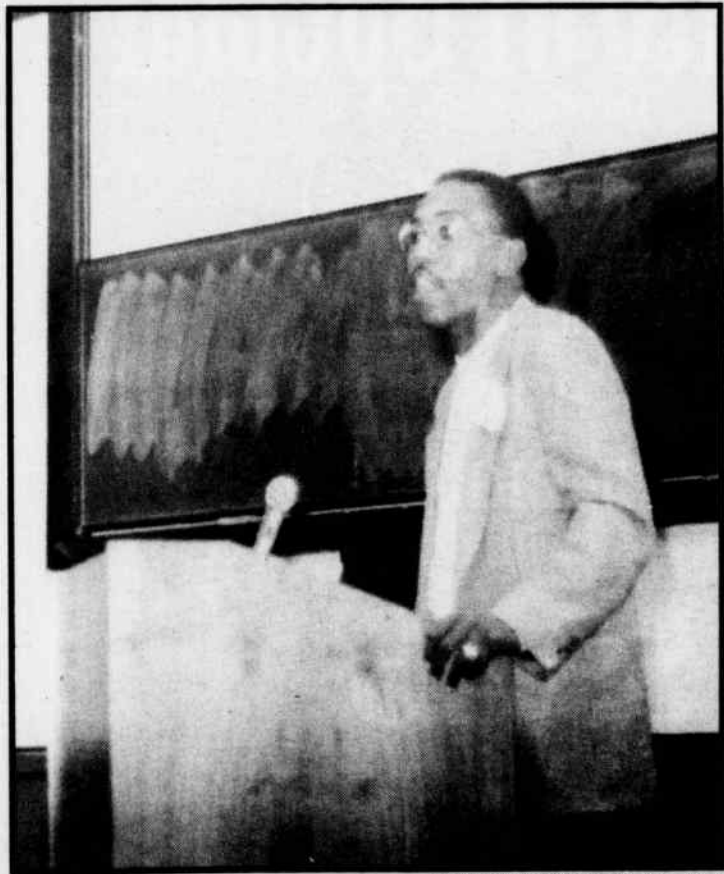

AKA presents 'A Salute to Black Men'

The Nu Rho Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha, Sorority Inc. (AKA) honored the accomplishments of black men on October 24 in the Ferguson Auditorium through a program titled "A Salute to Black Men."

According to DeAnna Hawkins, the sisters of the Nu Rho Chapter of AKA wanted to emphasize the black male as an achiever in order to erase the stereotype of black men as drug abusers or criminals.

DeAnna Hawkins, President of AKA, stated, "The program is to uplift the black males and try to help them feel positive about themselves."

Individuals representing a variety of organizations participated in the program. Phi Beta Sigma member, Chico James, recited an original poem entitled "A Man in a Mirror." Three members of the Good News Church sang "The Shepard's

Song," accompanied by organ music. Tamu Miller of Alpha Phi Alpha read the poem "The Test of a Man," which he said he reads to motivate himself.

The sisters of AKA also included a formal fashion show, which was emceed by Jacquelyn McMillan, in the program.

Andreana Washington performed a dance routine to "A Song for You."

"I danced because the dance troop was going to dance and there wasn't room for them. ... I just thought that the message out of the song was very appropriate," Washington said.

The keynote speaker for the evening was Dr. Darrel Wheeler, a professor of Social Work at UNCG.

Wheeler told the audience that there are too many role models and not enough mentors.

"We as Afro-American males have a responsibility to validate

our self-worth with one another," Wheeler said.

Wheeler also said he is astonished that Americans continue to evaluate black males on death statistics.

"I think the most important message [from the program] was ... [Dr. Wheeler's speech] on be-

ing a role model and a mentor. ... Our black men in the community can be role

models and mentors. ... They're not all doomed," Washington said.

Several black high school students were recognized for their character, leadership, and involvement. Sekondi Baldwin, Greg Holman, and Omar Cooper each received certificates honoring their achievements.

NKrumah Lewis, a UNCG sophomore from Durham, was recognized as the Outstanding Afro-American Male at UNCG. The award was based on G.P.A., community and church involvement, campus activities, and an essay.

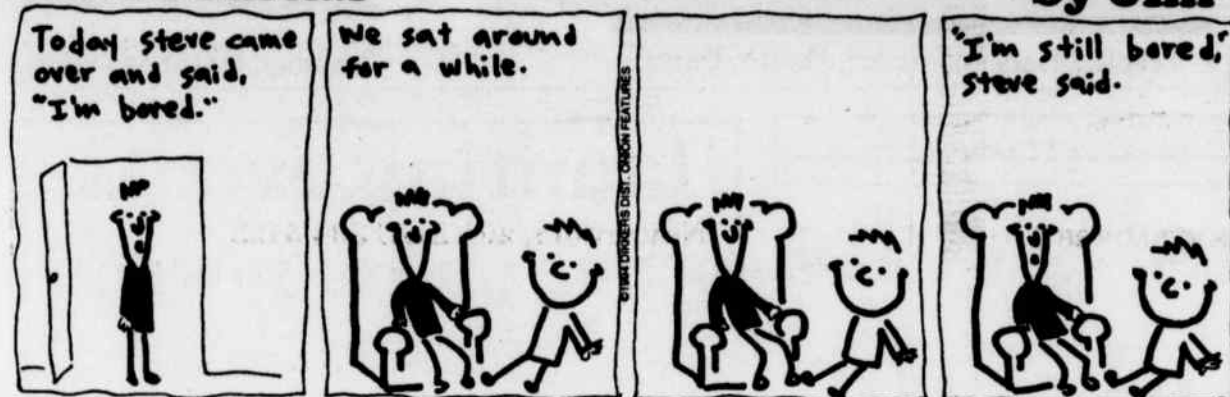

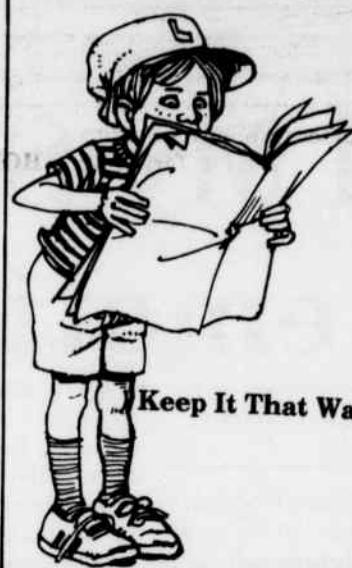

Play Review

'All My Sons' gives an emotional ride

The UNCG Studio Production of Arthur Miller's "All My Sons" debuted Wednesday in the Curry Building Auditorium.

This play is quite impressive, powerful, and entertaining.

It involves the interwoven Keller family, the psychological impact of World War II, the death of a brother, the dynamic relationship between a father who is hiding secrets, and a son who worships him.

First year grad student Sam Parker plays the father, Joe Keller, and is excellent as a main provider and destroyer of the Keller family.

Joe Keller's credibility as an honest man and an honest father is challenged due to faulty parts his company supplied

which resulted in the death of 27 pilots.

Steve, Keller's partner and old neighbor, has been found responsible and was imprisoned for the tragedy.

His daughter, Ann, and her marriage to Keller's son, Chris, is the play's focus.

"All My Sons" vaguely reminds me of Eugene O'Neill's play "Long Day's Journey Into Night" because of the main focus on the interaction between the characters of the family.

Every character deals directly with the others and the audience gets to witness the changing emotions and actions in the various relationships in the family.

"All My Sons" closely examines the connection between the father and son and its subsequent downfall.

Major themes include guilt,

shame, and blame and there complex interplay.

The plot is easy to follow and the actors make it flow much easier than I could explain it.

Arthur Miller's play itself is fantastic, but the UNCG production is equally impressive.

The interchange between the characters is intense and extremely believable.

The delivery of emotional and climatic scenes made me completely forget that I was writing an article.

The set was well thought out, the costumes were great, and I really found nothing defective I could dwell upon.

The actors, directors, additional staff, and everyone involved deserves applause.

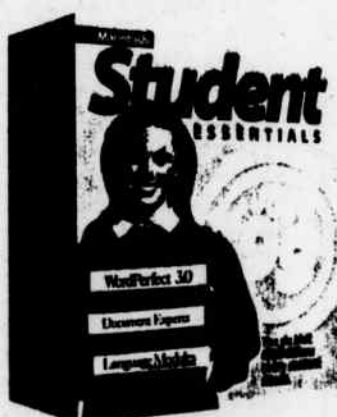

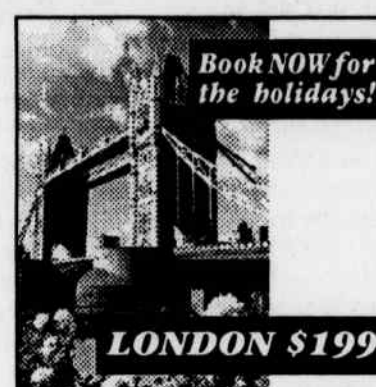

Spartans beat Winthrop, clinch Big South title

Mahoney, Powell net goals as Spartans clinch regular season title and top seed in Big South Tournament

On Wednesday evening the UNCG men's Soccer team defeated Winthrop University 2-0, in a Big South Conference road game.

The game was a match-up between two of the top three teams in the Big South Conference and possibly for the top seed in the Big South Conference Tournament to be held at UNCG next weekend.

The Spartans struck just three minutes into the contest when senior forward Shawn Mahoney scored an unassisted goal when they looped the ball over the head of Eagle goalkeeper Jamie Ingfield.

With the goal, Mahoney has 30 points on the season and is the current leader among all Spartans.

It took almost 54 minutes for the Spartans to strike again when Scott Thomas launched a corner kick into the box. Senior midfielder Darren Powell headed the arching kick into the back of the net to ice the victory for the Spartans.

Powell scored his one hundredth point with the goal and becomes the first Spartan in Division One history to do so. He has 40 goals and 20 assists for his four year career. The 100 points ranks Powell eighth all-time on the Spartans' scoring

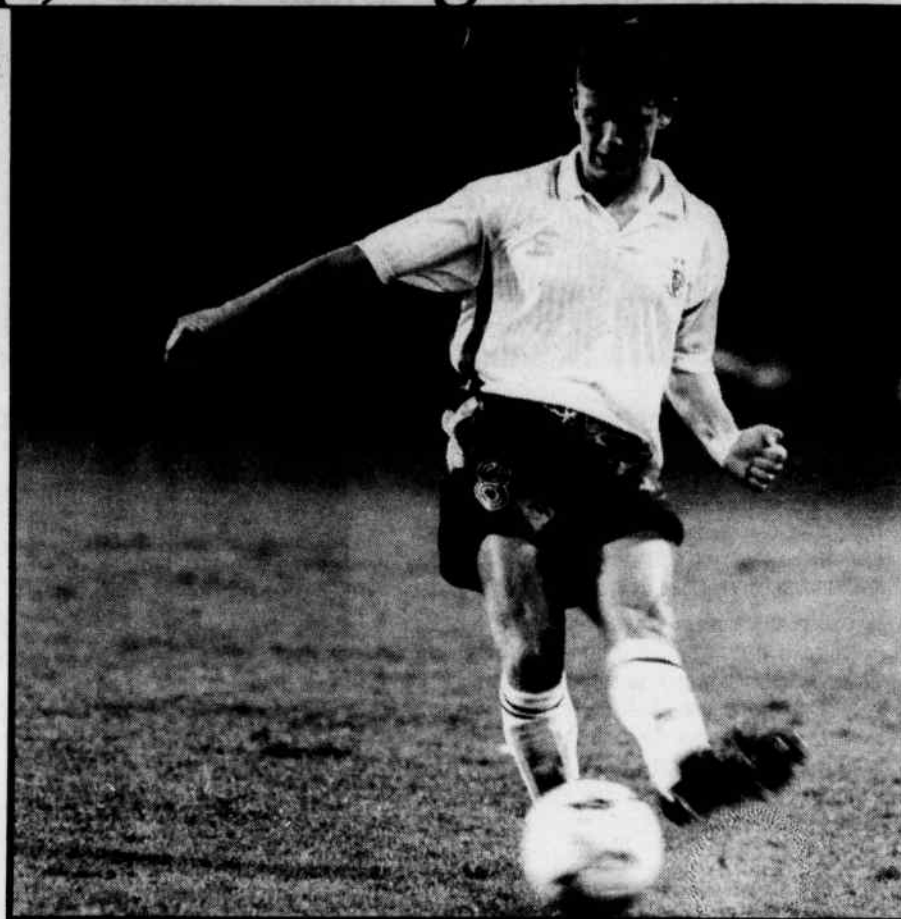
list. Powell returned from an apparent injury for the match.

The win comes on the heels of a 1-0 Spartan loss at the hands of the University of Maryland Baltimore-County on Saturday. It was the first time the Spartans had been shut out at home in over two seasons.

The win also clinches the Big South Conference regular season title and the top seed in the Big South Conference Tournament for the Spartans. They must win the Big South Tournament and a play-in against the winner of the Southern Conference Championship to return to the NCAA Tournament.

An at-large bid to the tournament would be unlikely because UNCG had dropped out of the South Region rankings with the UMBC loss.

The win improves the Spartans to 13-4-0 overall and 7-1-0 in the Big South Conference. The Spartans will end the season with a homecoming match versus College of Charleston on Saturday evening at 7 p.m. at the Spartan Soccer Stadium.

Men picked first, women second in Big South Conference basketball

The University of North Carolina at Greensboro was picked first in men's basketball and second in women's basketball yesterday by the Big South Conference.

The Big South Conference released its annual coaches and Sports Information Directors (SID) poll at the annual media day in Lynchburg.

The league's coaches picked Towson State over UNC Greensboro and the leagues SIDs picked the Spartans. The Spartans edged Towson by six points in the combined poll.

The Spartans begin play with open scrimmages on Saturday and Wednesday, November 9 and they have scheduled two preseason exhibitions for late November.

The Spartans will open their season at Wake Forest on Saturday, November 26 at 7 p.m. They will then play Campbell in Fayetteville on Saturday, December 3. This game will be aired live on regional television.

UNCG will play in the conference tournament for the first time at the end of

this season.

The conference championship will be aired live on ESPN2.

The Spartan women's team has been chosen to finish just behind Radford in both the coaches and the SID poll. The Spartans also finished just six points behind the league leaders.

The Spartans will begin play with their first exhibition on November 24 with a scrimmage against a touring team from Austria.

UNCG will have the opportunity to play UCLA, Georgia Tech, Providence or Clemson at the Northern Lights Invitational in Anchorage, Alaska, December 19-21.

The Spartans will warm up for this tournament December 7, with a game at Wake Forest.

The Spartans will compete in the Big South Conference Tournament, March 8-11 in Radford, Virginia.

The Spartans will host Montana State and Appalachian State, in addition to a full slate in the Big South Conference.
