### fighting violence udents

The sixth annual March Against Violence was held on Tuesday, April 11.

"Every four hours, an African-American child is murdered. Every 6 hours, a white American child is murdered. The number one concern of every person in our neighborhoods is the fear of violence. It's a real fear and a real danger. There has been a steep increase in sex violence here in Greensboro over the last five years. The Governor's Report on Safety says that acts of violence have almost quadrupled in the last ten years... violence is at epidemic proportions," said Dr. Sheree Marshall.

The program and march began at the Plaza. The event was sponsored by Peer Helpers Advancing Sexuality Education (PHASE II), the Student Government Association, Campus Activities Board, Women's Leadership Coalition, Zeta Phi Beta sorority, Alpha Delta Pi sorority, Tobacco USA, and the Health Education and Wellness Center, which is part of the Student

Marshall, of the department of Human Development and Family Studies, was the keynote speaker. During her address, she asked listeners to carefully consider how the public defines violence, and to think about the acts of violence that they have personally witnessed.

Marshall has been researching the causes and effects of violence in our area and said, "We need to understand the nature of violence in our community. Human development comes from a variety of factors, and we cannot understand violence without recognizing the influences of home life.'

Marshall stated that her research was still in the early stages and that she is in the process of defining the problem and receiving input from community members

After Marshall's address, Dr. Barton Parks and community activist Tracey Lucas conducted an interactive listening exercise with the group. Parks and Lucas asked listeners to pair up and take turns listening to one an-

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
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
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

Two new curators have been appointed to Weatherspoon Art Gallery at UNCG.

Thomas H. Kochheiser of St. Louis, Mo., curator of exhibitions; and Dr. Douglas Dreishpoon of Tampa, Fla., curator of collections, were appointed April 1. Both were announced by Ruth K. Beesch, director of Weatherspoon Art Gallery.

"I am very impressed with the outstanding talent and expertise that Kochheiser and Dreishpoon bring to the Weatherspoon Art Gallery," said Beesch. "Their range of experience is perfectly matched to the Weatherspoon's collections, exhibitions, and programs. Dreishpoon has a strong research and publication background. Dreishpoon has organized major traveling exhibitions and is extraordinarily well-connected. As the curator of collections, Dreishpoon will be a tremendous asset as we work with donors and collectors to ensure the future growth of the

Weatherspoon Collection. Kochheiser brings an excellent eye and ability to search out new artistic talent. The Weatherspoon's reputation is often attributed to our ability to identify and support emerging or under-recognized artists. In his role as curator of exhibitions, Kochheiser will have the opportunity to build on a superb track record as a curator who has that uncanny ability to sense where the art scene is going next."

Kochheiser has been director of Gallery 210 at the University of Missouri-St. Louis since 1985.

At the Weatherspoon, Kochheiser will plan and implement temporary and permanent exhibitions for the gallery.

Kochheiser succeeds Trevor Richardson in the position.

Earlier, Kochheiser was publicity coordinator and box office manager for the Oberlin College Department of Theatre and Dance from 1982-1983.

Kochheiser is a graduate Ohio State University and holds versity and a doctoal degree from a master's degree from Oberlin City University of New York.

As director of Gallery 210, he organized or presented numerous exhibitions, including works by Heide Fasnacht, Russell Crotty. Erika Rothenberg, M.M. Lum, Sue Williams, Hannah Wilke, Dotty Attie, and Holly Roberts.

Kochheiser's thematic exhibitions include "The Emblematic Woman: Contemporary Female Portraiture."

Dreishpoon has been curator of contemporary art at the Tampa Museum of Art since 1992. At the Weatherspoon, Dreishpoon will be responsible for the growth, preservation, and presentation of the gallery's permanent collection of more than 4,000 art works.

Dreishpoon succeeds Dr. Arlette Klaric in the post.

From 1982-1991, Dreishpoon was curator of exhibitions and research at Hirschl and Adler Galleries in new York City.

A graduate of Skidmore College, Dreishpoon holds his master's degree from Tufts Uni-

### **All-Student Exhibition recognizes** artistic talent of UNCG students

Through April 28, student art work will be on display in the McIver Gallery.

There are currently about 100 pieces of undergraduate and graduate art work on display for the annual All-Student Exhibi-

Professor A. Doren, who teaches photography, stated, "I

collect the best work of my students throughout the semester to be included in the show.

The exhibition, which has been growing in size in recent years, invited students to submit one to three objects to be judged.

A panel of three faculty members, including Professors George Dimock (art history), Doren (photography), and Pat

Wasserboehr (painting), reviewed over 220 pieces for both inclusion in the show, and for a number of awards.

There are two Chancellor's Awards, one for graduate, and one for undergraduate work. The awards go to the best piece at each level.

The pieces selected will not only become part of the Weatherspoon Art Gallery's permanent collection, but the artists will also receive cash awards.

Other awards include five UNCG bookstore awards, an Addam's bookstore award, a Carolina Camera award, and two faculty awards.

We, as the faculty, think that students should be awarded for what they do throughout the year," said Doren.

For the past five years, the UNCG bookstore has donated award money to the show

This year, awards total \$750. Tony Metcalf, the manager of the UNCG Bookstore, explained the bookstore's willingness to do-

nate. "We are basically supportive of the art department, and are hoping to encourage participation, and to gain entries into the competition, Metcalf said.

The show is an excellent representation of what UNCG's department of art has to offer, both two and three-dimensional.

Virtually all mediums

are represented, including drawing, printmaking, photography, painting, and sculpture.

According to Doren, "It's a good looking show with excellent work. I have been with it for the past four years, and it has been growing each year."

The All-Student Exhibition is free and open to the public and may be viewed anytime the McIver building is open. A number of the pieces are also available for sale.

Award winners will be announced at a reception to be held on April 28 at 1 p.m.

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# partans extend streak to eig

With the national polls set to come out on Wednesday, the UNCG Spartan softball team had one last shot at impressing the pollsters on Tuesday afternoon. The Spartans did so with a sweep of Metro conference rival UNC Charlotte.

The Spartans got another pair of superb pitching performances from Winn Hazelgrove and Erin Chandler to record the second pair of shutouts in four games for the Spartans, winning 6-0 and 8-0 respectively.

In the first game, UNCG used a four run first inning, all of them unearned, to seal the victory.

The final two runs came for the Spartans in the bottom of the fifth when Lori Lette connected on her first home run of the year.

The two-run shot to right center field was her first home run of the season.

Hazelgrove gave up four hits while picking up her 17th victory on the season, running her record to 17-7 this year.

In the second game, the Spartans jumped out to a 3-0 advantage in the first inning and got two more in the third and three in the sixth to secure the 8-0 victory.

Chandler gave up just two hits to win her 17th straight game and improve her record to 20-2 on the year.

Spartan designated player, Tara Steinhardt picked up a pair of hits and drove in three RBIs for the game.

Shonda Spagnola and Pam Houston both picked up two hits as well for the Spartans.

The Spartans improved their record to

38-11 overall and are currently riding an eight game win streak. UNC Wilmington dropped to 13-40 overall.

The Spartans had hoped that 38 wins and the eight straight games won since the last poll was released would bring them into the top 25.

Last week the national poll listed the Spartans as the 26th best team in the nation and they were only one vote away from the Top 25. The Spartans received 17 votes for the poll.

The Spartans received only four votes and dropped out of the top 30 in the na-

Several traditionally strong teams with .500 or slightly better records moved ahead of the Spartans.

With only four conference games remaining, UNCG is still in the race for the top spot in the Big South Conference tournament next weekend.

The Spartans lost to Canisius in the NCAA play-in series last year at UNCG after winning the Conference Tournament. UNCG will need to win all four of the remaining conference games to gain the top seed in the tournament.

UNCG will play again on Saturday when they will play host to Big South Conference rival Charleston Southern at noon on Campus Field.

# CG tennis teams quietly successful

In deciding who to pick for the "Athlete of the Week" segment, The Carolinian sports department decided that it would be a member of the tennis teams at UNCG. We could not choose between all of the deserving athletes on each team so we decided to choose both the women's and men's tennis teams.

Both teams will compete in the Big South Tennis Tournament this weekend at Radford, Virginia.

The women's team is led by senior Rachel Matlin. The Hewlett, New York native has played in almost every slot for the Spartans, posting a 9-9 overall record and going undefeated in the Big South Conference.

Matlin was paired with freshman Emily Berger in the doubles category, and playing out of the number three slot, they posted a 10-3 overall record and 7-0 in the Big South Conference, leading the

team in doubles competition. Matlin also teamed up with freshman Kimberly Ledbetter from Marietta, Georgia. The Matlin-Ledbetter combination was 4-2 overall.

Perhaps the most exciting player on the team is sophomore all-conference selection Natalie Teague from Hickory, North Carolina. Teague was the Southern Conference Freshman-of-the-Year when she played at Furman in the 1993-94 season.

After joining the Spartans in the spring semester, Teague took over the number one spot and posted a 10-5 record overall and 6-1 in the conference. Teague and Maggie Berger went 4-3 in the doubles department even though they played in the number one spot.

When sophomore Jen Wisinski was paired with Teague, the duo had a 1-7 overall record. In singles competition, Maggie Berger went 8-4 in the spring season, but a 1-6 record in the fall dropped her below .500.

The Spartans finished with an 8-7 overall record in the spring and did not improve on last year's dual-match record of 11-7. Nevertheless, the Spartans did improve over last year's dual match conference record by two games, posting a 5-2 conference mark this year. UNCG was 5-4 last season. These wins included, on March 25, the first ever Spartan victory over Coastal Carolina.


The men's team started out the spring season losing nine of twelve matches. Four of these were by only one point to teams such as South Carolina and Appalachian State.

The Spartans would then rebound to win eight of their last nine matches and post a perfect 8-0 record in the Big South Conference. Senior Adam Merrick, who was named All-Big South for this season posted an 8-12 overall record for the Spartans, playing out of the top spot.

Three other Spartans posted outstanding overall records. Sophomore Tyler Roberts posted a 15-10 overall record including an outstanding 7-0 mark in Big South Conference play. The Charlotte native played out of the number four spot for UNCG where he was 8-2 overall.

Another UNCG sophomore, Adam

Short posted a 15-11 overall record and also went undefeated at 8-0 in the conference. Short, a sophomore from Wilmington, Delaware, played number six for UNCG this season.

The final Spartan with a plus .500 record is sophomore Dan Cook. Cook was 12-12 overall, playing out of the number five spot where he was 9-2 in the spring. Cook also posted a perfect record in the Big South.

Short and Roberts combined to form the number two doubles team for UNCG. posting a 14-9 overall record and a 3-0 conference total. Sophomores Cook and Banks Bostian were the number three doubles team for the Spartans this season. The pair combined for a 10-6 record overall and a 6-2 Big South record.

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According to head coach Paul Lubbers, the Spartans expected to be in this position at the end of the season, even though they have such a young team.

"If we get through the conference championships with such a young group," said Lubbers, "we can move on to bigger and better things later on."

Both teams began their quest for conference titles today at Radford Virginia. Each team won their first round matches with the Men's team defeating Liberty and the Women's team downing the University of Maryland Baltimore County.

The teams will continue play tomorrow and with a little luck and business as usual, the top-seeded men and the third-seeded women should be in a good position to capture the Conference title.


Many fraternities and sororities have national "philanthropies" to which they make annual donations. This helps them add greater meaning to their Greek experiences.


