March a Busy Month for UNCG Women

The month of March is going to be full of events for women on UNCG's campus.

Frantz Dautruche, representative of student life is organizing different programs that deal with issues concerning women for women's history month. This month's celebration of women has three components to it.

The first component is a movie series. "The Joy Luck Club" will be shown on March 13 at 2 p.m. in the Joyner

Lounge of the EUC. "What's Love Got To Do With It" will be shown at 8 p.m. in the Alexander Lounge of the EUC on the same day. "Steel Magnolias" will be shown on March

15 in the Joyner Lounge of the EUC at 2 p.m. "Charlie's Angels" will be shown on the same night at 8 p.m. in the Kirkland Lounge. "Charlie's Angels" will also be playing

March 16 in the Alexander Room of the EUC at 8 p.m. "I'm trying to get times convenient for commuter and [residential] students," said Dautruche. "I tried to be very diverse with the times."

The second component consists of the Wellness/Health area. A group by the name of "Two Thin," which is a lecture/show with a comedy slant about eating disorders; will be performing on campus. The show will be on held on March 27 in the parlor of Weil/Winfield at 8 p.m. Refreshments will also be served.

"Housing Residence Life, the Wellness Center, Community Advisors of North and South Spencer, and Multicultural Affairs committee will all be sponsoring this event," said Dautruche. March 29, relationship therapist Ellen Gootblatt will be lecturing in the Jarrell lecture hall at 8 p.m. "Gootblatt is an excellent woman that gives wonderful information on relationships and helping men and women understanding and appreciating the inherent differences between the sexes," Dautruche said.

The last component will be the arts. There will be a group coming from L.A. by the name of ADAWE, which is comprised of six dynamic, diverse women creating roots music with the drums and voice. Dautruche also said that they are doing this in conjunction with the Shades and Color conference. To see ADAWE, fees for students will be \$10 and \$17 for the general public. There will be a multicultural fashion show, Sharome Price, Dance Ensemble and

SGA Election

In a matter of weeks, UNCG's Student Government Association will undergo reconstruction, so to speak. However, no bulldozers or loud drills will be added to those already in use on campus. Instead, enthusiastic student leaders will be campaigning in order to earn votes for the upcoming Fall 2001 - Spring 2002 SGA elections.

Nominations for SGA officers began Monday March 12 and will continue through March 16 between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. in the dining hall Atrium. Nominees for the SGA officers will be notified by March 21, and will be asked to confirm their nomination, sign affidavits, and sign election packets detailing the rules and regulations of the election between March 22 and March 27.

After all the official technical details have been successfully completed, students running for an SGA office will have ten days of campaigning between March 27 and April 6. On April 9 and 10, students will cast their votes for their favorite candidate. Finally, on

Let's Go Dancing: UNCG vs. Stanford

After a most improbable last second shot to win the Southern Conference tournament last weekend, the Spartans will be headed to California to go dancing. The Spartans received the conference's automatic bid to the NCAA tournament after defeating UT-Chattanooga on Sunday March 4 in Greenville, South Carolina.

UNCG found out where it would be playing this Sunday, March 11, along with the rest of the 64 teams that will join them in the tournament. UNCG will be headed to the West Regional as the number sixteen seed to face the number one seed in the west and the number one team in the nation the Stanford Cardinal. Stanford is representing the Pac-10 conference as their conference champion. The game will be in San Diego, California and be played on Thursday, March 15 at around 5 p.m. (30 minutes after the completion of the 2:30 game in the west regional).

Out of the more than 300 Division I NCAA basketball teams only 65 (this year the field was expanded by one team) receive invitations to go dancing (AKA the NCAA Tournament). This will be UNCG's second trip to the tournament since the team moved to division I in 1991. The last trip came in 1996 when

UNCG lost in the first round to Cincinnati 66 to 61.

UNCG will enter this game one a three game-winning streak and will bring a 19-11 record into the game. UNCG has been on an emotional high after the last second buzzer beater that put the Spartans in this position. This buzzer beater was played over and over on Sportscenter and made play of the day on CNN. UNCG brings a team into the tournament that shoots the three very well at a 38% cliff. The Spartans will also hope to make many trips to the free throw line. The Spartans shoot better than 77% at the line, which is third best in

the country. The Spartans will be able to put two big men in the game to help battle with Stanford's Collins twins with 6-11 freshman Sean McCarthy and 7-2 freshmen Nathan Popp. UNCG will combat the number one team in the nation with the line up of: Courtney Eldridge (5'9" junior guard), Nathan Jameson (6'1" Senior guard), Jay Joseph (6'4" Freshmen), David Schuck (6'8" junior forward also known as Mr. Game Winning Shot), and Nathan Popp (7'2" Freshman). The Spartans are coached by second year coach Fran McCaffery. The former Notre Dame assistant under ESPN college basketball commentator

Stanford will enter this contest with a 28-2 record and a 16-2 mark in their conference. The only losses for the Cardinal this season came against Arizona and UCLA. Stanford has been upset in the second round in the last two NCAA tournaments. The Cardinal have an impressive starting line up with limited resources on an injury-laden bench. They are led inside by the

Safe Zone

The Wellness Center is sponsoring the Safe Zone program, which is open to UNCG faculty, staff, and students and designed to increase awareness and sensitivity to issues faced by gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender students.

Sexual minority students are often subject to rejection, harassment, and violence. According to the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, over 1300 violent incidents occurred against gays and lesbians on college campuses over the course of a year. Lack of support and role models, homophobia, and heterosexism can potentially threaten the lives and success of students. Suicide was reported as the number one cause of death among sexual minority youth by a 1989 Federal Task Force on Youth Suicide.

In response to these concerns, the Wellness Center developed Safe Zone. The Safe Zone training will be held on Friday, April 6 in the Associated Campus Ministries Building and will address adolescent development, inclusive language, and helping skills. Once training is completed, participants will receive a certificate and a referral/resource manual.

The UNCG Office of Public Safety and Police is sponsoring a series of free Rape Aggression Defense (RAD) classes, which will be held in the Human Health and Performance building March 19, 20, 26, and 27 and April 16, 17, 23, and 24 from 6:30 p.m.-9:30 p.m.

The RAD classes are hands-on self-defense classes taught by a certified UNCG police officer and open to females

only. The objective of the classes is to get away from an attacker. Those interested must fill out a registration form either at the police station next to the Atrium or online at www.uncg.edu/psp/prevention/rad.html. All four sessions must be attended in order to complete the class. Students who complete the class will receive a certificate, which will allow them to take refresher courses at other campuses.

Student Historic Preservation Association, a new organization on campus, will host "Afternoon on the Lawn" from 3 to 7 p.m. on March 22 in front of the former Chancellor's Residence. Local bands None the Wiser, Hushpuppy, and Brothers in the Kitchen will be performing at the event. To gain admission into the fundraiser, a five-dollar donation can be made or a t-shirt can be bought for \$10. All the money raised goes to Preservation North Carolina, the nonprofit organization who is leading the

fundraiser effort to move the Chancellor's Residence.

The mission of SHPA is "To increase awareness of and promote support for the historic preservation among students and the community, as well as to provide a forum for the discussion of issues and the expansion of knowledge beyond the classroom."

Founder and President of SHPA, Susannah Franklin said, "I think that the effort to save this house is important, not just because of its historical importance or architectural beauty, but because preserving the unity of a campus is what makes a college more than just a conglomeration of random build-

ings and various departments, but rather a community."

Franklin also said, "I hope the fundraising efforts of Preservation Greensboro, Inc. and Preservation North Carolina will succeed, because the University will gain an impressive new Admissions/Visitor's Center. These older buildings, from UNCG's earlier days as the state's Women's College, have a charm and character that is just not replaceable."

The Chancellor's Residence, built in 1922, will be demolished if the 1.8 million dollars needed to move and restore the building is not raised by July 1, 2001. If the

money is raised, the building will be moved to the corner of Spring Garden Street and College Avenue.

SHPA currently has twelve active members in the organization. Franklin said, "We are certainly looking for more interested students to work on this event or to join us for other events coming up this semester." SHPA will meet on Thursday, March 15 at 7 p.m. in the Edwards Lounge of the Stone Building to discuss the Chancellor's Residence fundraiser. Franklin urges, "Anyone interested in the house, preservation or history in general is welcome!"

UNCG Staffers Win Many Awards

GREENSBORO - The University Relations Department at The University of North Carolina at Greensboro won five awards at the 2001 CASE III District Achievement Awards contest.

The department won one grand award, three excellence awards and one special merit award at the annual awards ceremony and conference held recently in Atlanta.

CASE, The Council for Advancement and Support of Education is an international association of education advancement officers, who in-

clude alumni administrators, fund raisers, public relations managers, publications editors, and government relations officers. The ultimate goal of advancement professionals is to enhance their institutions by bringing in support - be it in the form of money, alumni loyalty, public esteem, or new students.

The awards, said Helen Dennison, assistant vice chancellor for University Relations, illustrate the high caliber of work done by the department.

"We do what we do to showcase the University," Dennison said, "but it's made more special when that work is recognized by a jury of your peers."

UNCG won the Grand Award, the highest in any category, for its campaign to educate the public about the \$3.1 billion UNC Bond Referendum. The effort was entitled "Tell Ten People" and was headed by Dr. Cindy Farris, special assistant to Chancellor Patricia Sullivan. Other staff members working on the campaign were Dennison, Robin Adams, Miriam Barkley, Sue Faucette, Kurt Ward, Steve Gilliam, Natasha Ashe, Lyda Carpen, Beth English, Laurie Gengenbach, Donna Gibbs, Becky VanderVeen and Bert VanderVeen.

The three Excellence

Awards were for: Carpen, for design of a brochure for the Weatherspoon Art Gallery; Bert VanderVeen for a series of photographs taken to illustrate UNCG's facility needs and Ward for a story in the alumni magazine entitled "The WC Three." The story chronicled the three Women's College students who participated in the 1960 Woolworth sit-ins.

The Achievement Award was won by Barkley, Carpen and Bert VanderVeen for the 1998-99 Chancellor's Report.

Movie Review: It Bleeds and It Leads

Yes, ladies and gentlemen, I actually LIKED something for once! 15 Minutes is exciting, engaging and I recommend that you see it!. Emil (Karel Roden) and Oleg (Oleg Taktarov), ex-cons, pay a visit to America to collect an outstanding debt from a friend. Oleg, who has a strange and unhealthy obsession with movies, steals a video camera and begins to film their adventure in New York City.

However, their adventure takes a rather unhealthy turn. Emil's friend cannot pay him and in anger, Emil kills his friend and his wife while Oleg films it. Crazy, right? You'd think Emil would destroy the tape, right?

Wrong. After watching some sleazy American talk shows and learning about some American laws, Emil comes up with a plan. He and Oleg will film their crimes, plead insanity and get rich off of movie and book deals. And so they continue on their murderous rampage.

On their case is Eddie Flemming (Robert Dinero aka THE MAN), a celebrity cop and known as one of New York's finest. Along for the ride is Jordy Warsaw (Edward Burns), an arson investigator who was sent on the case when the police thought it was "only a fire". Unfortunately, Emil and Oleg succeed in finding

Eddie's apartment and after he puts up a pretty good fight, he gets killed by the madmen. New York City is devastated.

Now, here's where things start to get really sick. Robert Hawkins (Kelsey Grammer), a journalist for a tabloid news show and friend to Eddie Flemming, receives a call from Emil. He will give him the tape of Eddie's murder for \$1 million. Blood thirsty for ratings, Robert agrees and airs his murder for all of New York to see while Oleg and Emil wait in a Planet Hollywood to be recognized and arrested.

I'm gonna stop with the plot right there, since a lot of you probably would like to see this film. Most everything about this movie was done right. Robert Dinero, as expected, does a fine performance and so does Kelsey Grammer, though it is very hard for me to look at him and not think of him as Frasier Crane. Karel Roden

and Oleg Taktarov are very convincing cold-blooded murderers and generally creepy guys.

One thing I will complain about, because I must complain about something, is the message the movie so sorely tries to convey. Director/screenwriter John Herzfeld attempts to use this movie as a statement about violence in the media. If you choose to look at the movie this way, you will see a hypocritical mess of action and words. So I beg you, DO NOT look at this movie as a statement. It will overshadow the intricate plot, well written script and fantastic performances by all of the actors in this movie.

15 Minutes is rated R for, you guessed it, VIOLENCE. It is currently being shown at The Grande, located on Northline Ave., in the Friendly Shopping Center.

Book Review: Miss Wyoming

Douglas Coupland's latest novel, Miss Wyoming is hard to fit into a genre or categorize in any way. The novel jumps from romance to mystery and becomes something far from a typical story. Miss Wyoming tells the story of a former child beauty pageant winner and sitcom star and how her life becomes entwined with that of a movie producer.

The story is good and the characters are interesting in that they are not exactly typical. Susan Colgate was born to a mother who was determined to escape her redneck roots and forced her daughter to participate in numerous child beauty

pageants throughout her youth. Susan's success in the pageant world led to her being offered a starring role in a family sitcom which resulted in a great deal of fame for the then teenage girl. After the sitcom is canceled, Susan marries a rock star and all but fades into oblivion aside from several low budget films.

But Susan's story truly begins when she is flying from New York to Los Angeles and her plane crashes. Susan is the only survivor, and rather than staying at the crash site, Susan spends a year living in anonymity, wearing wigs and traveling under the guise of another person.

John Johnson is the other main character of the novel. He

is a movie producer who had a string of hits, followed by some flops that greatly damaged his career. These failures along with a dangerously bad drug habit and a tendency to get into other kinds of trouble sent John Johnson into a deep depression and caused him to be greatly ill at one point. During his illness, he spent time in a hospital, and saw a "vision" of Susan in his mind. This is where the two characters become linked, and once John recovers and goes on his own spiritual journey, it is a stroke of fate that puts him and Susan at a restaurant together and sets the stage for their meeting.

The novel is extremely readable, and relaxing. The only

thing that bothered me about the book as a whole is that the majority of it is told in flashbacks and sometimes the plot gets lost in all of the stories about the past. The stories are mostly necessary to understand the characters of Susan and John, but because the author jumps so abruptly from past to present, it is sometimes hard to distinguish what is going on. Unfortunately, the timing for this review is off, because I honestly would have strongly recommended this novel for light reading over spring break, but instead, I now suggest that you pick it up for a fun and relaxing read over the summer.

Stellarcon is celebrating its 25th year and is considered one of the oldest conventions in the Southeast and the oldest in the Carolinas devoted to science fiction, fantasy, and gaming.

Baseball Completes SoCon Series Sweep Of VMI With 14-9 Win

Doug Schutt led off the fourth inning with a solo home run and added an RBI single as the team batted around, sparking a seven-run onslaught that broke open a close game and propelled the baseball team to a 14-9 Southern Conference series sweep of VMI March 11 at home.

VMI's Chris Catanzaro established a new team career record in hits (219) with an RBI double to left center in the eighth inning. The Keydets have lost eight straight and six in a row in the conference.

Schutt's homer to right center, his first of the season, was

followed two batters later by back-to-back RBI doubles by Shane Schumaker and Chris Mittendorf. Mittendorf scored on a wild pitch one batter later, and Ramon Balderas had an RBI single and Schutt a two-run single to give UNCG (11-6, 5-1 SoCon) a 10-1 lead.

VMI (2-13, 0-6) scored six runs on four hits, an error, and a wild pitch in the fifth inning, highlighted by an RBI double to center field by Matt Ramsey. The Keydets added a single run in the sixth on a groundout by Ben Rand and in the eighth on Catanzaro's ground-rule double.

Catanzaro staked VMI to a 1-0 lead in the first inning with a triple to left field, but UNCG

answered with a three-run double to left center by Jesse Martin to take a 3-1 lead. The Spartans added a single run in the fifth, two in the seventh and one in the eighth.

Martin was 2-for-4 with four RBI and Schutt was 2-for-4 with three RBI to lead UNCG. Chris Cook and Shane Schumaker each had two hits and three runs.

Catanzaro was 4-for-5 with two RBI to lead VMI. Ryan Colvin was 3-for-4 and Rob Riley and Jason Annis each had two hits.

Nick Lockhart (3-3) earned the win for the Spartans, giving up five runs on seven hits in 4.1 innings. Willie Lyles (1-4) took the loss for VMI.

Road to the Final Four

This year's final four will culminate in Minneapolis in just three short weeks. Holly Lee hit two home runs to lift Coastal Carolina to a pair of extra inning wins over the softball team March 7 in Conway, SC.

Coastal won the first game 4-1 and the second 3-2.

In the opening game, Coastal Carolina struck first as Kristie Pulchinski hit a single and scored on Sara Thompson's triple for a 1-0 lead in the third inning.

The Spartans (12-7) tied the game in the top of the sixth inning as Andrea Harrison led off with a single down the left field line. Kristy Norton reached after being hit by a pitch and

both runners moved up a base on Misty Faircloth's sacrifice bunt. Harrison then scored on a sacrifice fly to left field by Joy Stogner.

After holding UNCG scoreless in the top of the eighth, Coastal opened the bottom of the inning with Pulchinski on second base due to the international tiebreaker rule. Pulchinski moved to third on a sacrifice by Sara Thompson and Sarah Lockett was intentionally walked to bring Lee to the plate, who promptly hit a three-run homer to end the game.

Stephanie Belden moved to 2-2 on the year as she scattered one run and four hits over eight innings, while striking out five. Amber Watson took the loss for UNCG, falling to 7-3 on the

year as she gave up four runs, three earned, on four hits in seven and one-third innings.

Harrison, Faircloth, Amanda Johnson, and Kim Benningfield all recorded hits for UNCG.

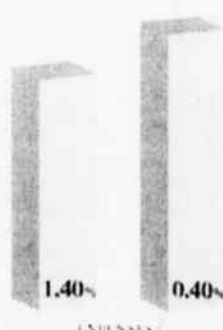

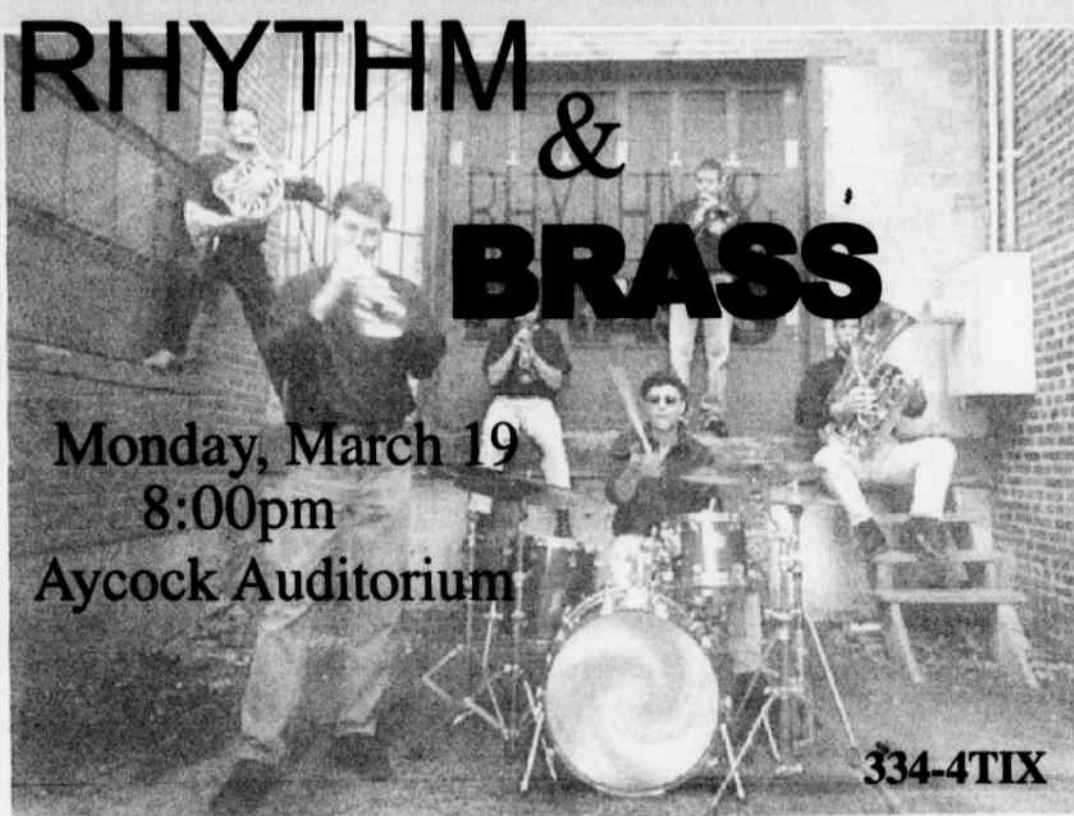
