I'd like to see long pipes between lips surrounded by white beards; I'd like to see sharp merchants with suspicious glances and cadis and vizirs who with one movement of the finger that they bend grant life or death just as they wish.

I'd like to see Persia

and mandarins paunchy beneath

Ms. Coker has also sung the role of Antonia in Man of La Mancha and the Mother in Amahl and the Night Visitors, at Appalachian State University. She was the winner of the 1999 state NATS competition.

Jesse Krebs of Raleigh, North Carolina is a junior at UNCG pursing a BM degree in Music Education. Active as both a classical and jazz performer in UNCG ensembles, Mr. Krebs is a featured soloist on the 1997 UNCG jazz ensemble recording Stealin' Apples. Additionally, Mr. Krebs received honorable mention in the 1997 NCMTNA Collegiate Woodwind Artist Competition. He is a member of Pi Kappa Lambda, the International Clarinet Association, CMENC, and serves as a University Marshall. He is also a recipient of a UNCG Student Excellence Award for the 1998-99 school year and holds an undergraduate research assistantship.

Michael Schallock is presently pursuing the Doctor of Philosophy degree in music education at UNCG. He is currently serving as assistant conductor of the TUBABAND, instructor of the Brass Methods course, and student teacher supervisor. Previously, he was Band Director at Laurel Park High School, Martinsville, VA, and Assistant Director of Bands at Itawamba Community College, Fulton, MS. Mr. Schallock graduated from the University of Southern Mississippi with a B.M.E. degree in music education and from the Ohio State University with a M.M. degree in Tuba Performance and Low Brass Literature. He maintains membership in such professional organizations as Music Educators National Conference, North Carolina Music Educators Association, and T.U.B.A.. Mr. Schallock now resides in Axton, Virginia, with his wife, Diane, and children, Grant and Leslie.

Seungmee Shin is currently pursuing a MM in Piano Performance at UNCG. She earned a BA degree in piano performance from Kyung-Hee University, Seoul, Korea. During her undergraduate studies with Professor Sun Hwang, she was a scholarship student for three years and graduated with honors. Ms. Shin was also a winner of several competitions including the Ho-Nam Arts Festival, the most famous piano competition in Kwang-Ju.

William Wright, conductor and pianist, received a B.A. degree from Amherst College, and a Master of Music degree from the New England Conservatory. Recent activities have included a concerto performance with the Charlotte Symphony and frequent chamber music performances with the symphony's principal players. In 1997, Mr. Wright spent a year teaching and performing in Islamabad, Pakistan. He has also held teaching positions at UNC Charlotte, Tufts University, Clark University, Harvard University Summer School, The Wellesley College Composer's Conference, The Walnut Hill School for The Arts, The Pingree School, and The Roxbury Latin School. Mr. Wright has performed at numerous summer festivals, including the Yellowbarn Chamber Music Festival, The Monadnock Music Festival, and The Merrywood Music Festival, and has been heard on Vermont Public Radio. He has performed in 27 countries of the world.
